As we enter Advent...

The days grow darker earlier and our lives get busier with planning the holiday season. We are aware that the world is changing around us. Some of that change is quite wonderful – we will consecrate our new Bishop DeDe the first Saturday of the month! Some of the change is uncertain – which rector candidate is the ‘right’ pick? And will that candidate feel the same way about us? And when will these changes take place?

Other changes are even less certain. Will the new administration, coming into office in January, bring the changes they’ve promised? We hope new jobs are created, that the middle class is shored up and the poor find relief. Other promised changes are worrisome – how will the threatened round-up of undocumented immigrants take place? We’ve heard rumors of internment camps and reminders of the round-up and mass deportation of Mexicans (and American citizens of Mexican descent) in 1954. We are already seeing a rise in hate-crimes – we’ve had two Episcopal churches desecrated with hate words and symbols recently.

We’re entering the season of darkness, but we must remember that this season is also a season of hope and preparation. It’s a time for discernment. What do we do now?

I recently read a meditation on the disciples’ confusion in following Jesus. It was posted to a website called ‘Episcopal Café’ and was written by Kristen Fontaine. She writes that she finds it hopeful that even though the disciples so often are confused by what Jesus says to them, they still follow and they still take action. Yes! Isn’t that also where we live! ‘Where in the world is God in this mess?’ is a question I often ask myself – not very faithful, perhaps, but often what I feel. And then I wonder, ‘What do I do now?’

We’ll be asking ourselves this question many times throughout the next couple of months because of all the changes we face. Now that Bishop DeDe is here, what do we do now? When your new Rector begins his or her work with you, what will you do? What will I do?

And what do we do if we see our neighbors and friends (and family, too) facing hatefulness and discrimination? What do we do if we feel our government is not living up to our values? What do we do?

Kristen ends her meditation with these words:

*Do the thing that you can do. Be persistent in faith and in actions
and follow in the best tradition of the slightly clueless disciples
who paved the way for a whole new faith.*

Do the thing that you can do. Whatever that thing is. That’s the thing that God is calling us to do. We can’t do everything. We can each do something. Mary could carry the Christ-child. Joseph could protect and care for her. The donkey could carry Mary. The barn could shelter the couple. The shepherds could look for the child and then celebrate. The Magi could bring gifts that would help pay for a getaway to Egypt. And then they could find a different route home.

Do the thing that you can do. May the Christ-light burn brightly in us and may we bring light and hope in the darkness.

The Search Committee has received the names of the candidates for our Rector position. We have scheduled preliminary interviews via the ZOOM software. Once we have completed the initial interviews, we will do reference checks and schedule the in-depth interviews. When we have completed our search process, the top candidate(s) will be invited to visit our parish. They will meet with the Vestry, tour the rectory, talk with the Bishop and deliver a sermon to the combined Search committee and vestry.

The Search Committee will recommend our chosen candidate to the Vestry and the Vestry will then complete the process of calling our new Rector.

Outreach News

The Thanksgiving food drive is winding up and we have, once again, given generously to help fill the shelves of the St. Charles food pantry. We have prepared the items from the mitten tree to be donated to St. Charles food pantry. This year so far we collected 68 hats, 47 pr. of gloves, 22 pr. of mittens, 8 scarves, 5 pr. of socks, 2 hat and glove sets, 1 hat and scarf set, 1 pr. ear muffs, 3 shirts, 1 baby hat and booties and 2 pair of child size shoes. The tree will remain up for 2 more weeks so there is still time to add to our donations.

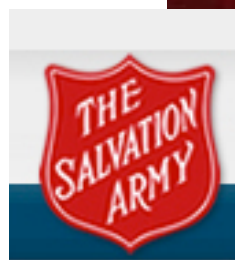
