

A Word

"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. I recently travelled back to Indiana after my mother moved out of the house where she's lived for nearly 50 years. She isn't able to get around as well or as confidently as she used to and since my stepfather's death, managing things has become quite difficult for her. Thankfully, she was able to move in with my niece and I get the sense she appreciates the slightly busier and more chaotic situation there.



Though her house won't be readied for sale until springtime, I needed to fetch a few items that were given to me plus some things that were mine from when I was quite a bit younger. It seems as though my parents just packed up everything that was mine after I left for the Navy and it was mostly still there, unsorted, and tucked away since the early 80's. My son is excited to receive my Lincoln Logs, but to be honest, a lot of it probably isn't worth keeping.

When I was younger I couldn't wait to leave that house, while at the same time it has been a kind of "home." A (mostly) unchanging point of stability in a life that's otherwise seen a lot of changes. So, the thought of someday soon visiting it for the last time has drawn forth all sorts of feelings.

Like many of you, I've gotten to place in my life where many of the places of my life have either been changed so much as to be unrecognizable or have just disappeared entirely. Of course, this change is just one more of the kinds of changes I've already been through so many times. But it is still an experience that has to be gone through; it can't be avoided or put off indefinitely.

Thankfully, as a follower of Jesus, I know that there are some things which will never change or perish, the love of God, Jesus' gift of redemption, the presence of the Holy Spirit, and the power of the sacraments.

These are the treasures that Jesus speaks of; the unfailing promises which God has offered us. If we anchor ourselves only to the things and promises of this world; then we miss out on the fulness of God's abundance. I will be saddened to see my childhood pass out of my life; but I also am hopeful that it will be a place where a new family might build their lives and their memories. And as always, the invitation of Jesus will beckon me to move always forward.

Opening prayer

Jon began the meeting at 7:05 p.m. with a prayer.

Review of previous minutes

Bob pointed out that the defibrillator was donated and then refurbished. Alison will make this correction. Sherry made a motion to approve the minutes from the August 29, 2022 vestry meeting. Rich seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

Reports

Treasurer- verbal report by Sherry

Sherry sent out the Financial Reports for June, July, and August in early September. Pledge contributions have caught up in September. We now have about \$12,000 in our checking account, and expect to get a check for \$12,000 from the daycare this week. All of the bills are paid through September. Sherry just sent Saint Mark's the invoice for September.

Rich asked if we should still send out the reminders about pledge payments, but Sherry doesn't feel we need to do this any more.

Bob and Jim will pick a time to do the audit before the end of the year.

Jon asked if there were any more questions for Sherry, but there were not any. Jack made a motion to accept the financial report. Rich seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

Wardens

Milt reports:

Milt said we had a successful clean up in the church basement thanks to Bob Shafer, Peter Bullock, and Milt Stevenson. Milt attended a nice Episcopal service in Phoenix attended by college students, and enjoyed having young people at the service.

Bob reports:

Bob made an appointment for October 29th to get rid of the TVs and computer equipment that are in the basement. Bob will get them there in the bed of his truck. Rich offered to help. Bob made one trip to the food bank. Bob arranged for a meeting with Solvay Bank on 10/19/22 at 4:30 at St. Luke's.

Members of the Finance Committee and any other interested members are encouraged to attend. Sherry will attend online.

Rector-

The partnership with St. Mark's Church is going well. Cindi and the hospitality chairperson from St. Mark's are planning a joint dinner. Jon started three Sacred Ground groups, with good conversations at both St. Luke's and St. Mark's. Norma Bullock would like to do a Christmas wreath raffle. There was a news van out in front of the church because Karen (daycare director) was interviewed about her knowledge about a boy who was being abused by his mother. Church attendance was better in September than it was for a couple of years. Jon has done some home visits.

New Business

Construction Projects with Daycare

Bob said that Karen (daycare director) wants to start a nursery at the daycare. We needed to add a little ramp at the exit door, and add a second sink in the room, which we did. Karen has a \$12,000 grant to fund the labor portion of installing a new vinyl laminate floor in the kitchen and parish hall. St. Luke's would be responsible for the materials only. Bob got an estimate for \$3900 for a high quality laminate at North Syracuse Sales. The work would be done in April by someone Karen knows. We will get another estimate or two for the cost of materials. Rich suggested we could take up a separate collection for this project. Other vestry members agreed with Rich.

Bob made a motion for us to move forward with the project. Milt seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

Utility Bills- topic added by Jack Young

Jack sent out an email entitled Energy Consumption- St. Lukes 2017 to Present, complete with a graph. We all know that energy costs (and the cost of almost everything!) are rising. Jon said that Jack's involvement with the gas and electric supply has saved St. Luke's a good deal of money the past five years. Jack offered to consult with St. Mark's about their energy bill to see if he can save them some money, too.

Old Business

ERD Partnership

Jim and Betsy Shake are willing to be the ERD Congressional Ministry Partners. ERD will send them materials for St. Luke's such as monthly newsletters. There are programs to do in Advent and Lent. Jon thanked Jim and Betsy for volunteering for this role.

Steering Committee

The first meeting of the Steering Committee for the partnership with St. Mark's Church will be on 9/28 at 5 pm at St. Mark's.

Adjourn-

Sherry made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 7:52 p.m. Jack seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

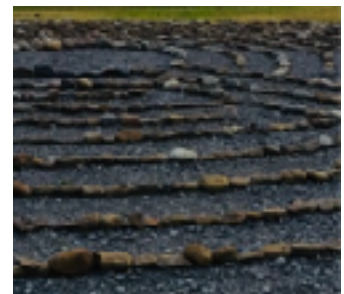
